

# Request for Proposal 2023-13 Third-Party Monitoring (TPM) in Sri Lanka

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#### **About GCERF**

GCERF is the global fund for preventing violent extremism. It supports local, community-level initiatives to strengthen resilience against violent extremist agendas. As a public-private partnership operating at the nexus of security and development, GCERF works in partnership and consultation with governments, civil society, and the private sector in beneficiary countries to support national strategies to address the local drivers of violent extremism. GCERF provides support to community-level initiatives that: seek to address locally specific drivers of radicalization; provide tangible, positive alternatives to what violent extremist groups may offer; counter violent extremist narratives and messaging and build the capacity of governments and civil society to counter violent extremism.



#### Background

GCERF's investment in Sri Lanka seeks to strengthen communal social cohesion, fostering sense of purpose among vulnerable youth and promoting equal access to opportunities. Since the commencement of the country program in 2021, 8800 people have been directly reached with interventions, aimed at achieving these outcomes.

The country financing mechanism is via an accelerated funding panel that comprises of a representation of government stakeholders and donors. Through this panel, a national grantee was selected, working with sub-grantees (currently numbered at 13) based in the program target districts, namely; Kurunegala, Kandy, Kaluthara, Batticaloa and Ampara.

Through this consortium, the program seeks to achieve the following objectives;

- 1. Enhanced capacity of youth to engage and advocate to local level government/ law enforcement authorities improving the trust and to play a protagonist role on mediating conflicts and preventing violent extremism
- 2. Enhanced trust and interactions between youth and people from other religious and ethnic communities and between students from different education institutions with improved critical thinking among students
- 3. Enhanced youth awareness on VE and resilience against hate speech, and disinformation campaign, with better access to positive messaging
- 4. Youth have access to sustainable livelihood opportunities to strengthen economic resilience

#### Objective

## Characteristics of the provider

To qualify it the applicant consultant or team should have the following qualities:

- 1. Experience in conducting third party monitoring exercises or independent evaluations in Sri Lanka or South Asia.
- 2. Expertise in PVE or related fields (such as peacebuilding or conflict resolution/transformation) in the context of Sri Lanka or South Asia
- 3. Technical writing skills, evidenced by published knowledge products.
- 4. Knowledge of Sinhala or Tamil is a **must** for at least one of the team member (if a team). Fluency in English is required for this position.

GCERF will not be responsibility for nor facilitate any duty of care arrangements, bidders must account for conducting own logistical, insurance, and security planning.

The preferred service provider is a recognised, credible institution or company with extensive experience in research/evaluation, particularly in Somalia.

Bidders without prior experience in governance, peace & conflict, and/or P/CVE and research methods need not apply.

The provider must comply with all applicable laws and regulations and should adhere to a strict confidentiality policy in relation to client information.

Its staffing levels, qualifications and expertise should be appropriate to be able to provide timely and high-quality services to GCERF. The provider should demonstrate a high degree of commitment to good customer service and a willingness to listen to the ideas and priorities of GCERF.

The fees charged should be reasonable, competitive and related to services rendered to the extent possible. The provider must comply with all applicable laws and regulations. It should adhere to a strict confidentiality policy in relation to client information. The provider should also abide by the following:

#### Selection of bidders

Bidders are requested to provide the most appropriate and cost-effective solution to meet the requirements.

The selection will be made based on several criteria that will be applied systematically to all bids received:

- Responsiveness to request;
- Proposed approach;
- Qualifications, experience and composition of the team;
- Credibility of the bidder organisation;
- Quality of the offer document; and
- Financial offer.
