

Current Programming: Systems Approach

National: Implementation of the National Action Plan for P/CVE in the Philippines at the local level, in coordination with the country support mechanism and various government actors such as the Department of Interior and Local Government, the Anti-Terrorism Council Project Management Center, and the Office of the Presidential Advisor on the Peace Process.

Community: Building PVE capacity among local authorities and institutions and reinforcing trust between communities and local authorities and working with religious and opinion leaders and working with students and teachers to protect youth from recruitment.

Individual: Building tolerance, community agency, positive social and economic alternatives, and critical thinking and life skills in youth and children.

Key Outputs

67 peace education for children, teaching values of kindness, gratitude and friendship.

Thematic working groups on Madaris, peace education, local governance and youth recruitment drafted action plans and signed a **Declaration of Commitment** to ensuring the continuation of coordination with all stakeholders. These action plans build on existing programming and will inform GCERF's next five-year country strategy (2023-2028)



With the aim of using job creation to reduce recruitment into VE groups, Synergeia Foundation organized a roundtable discussion with private sector partners and GCERF, developing a plan to explore further partnerships with local businesses in Mindanao.



GCERF's LKP Innovations for Poverty Action and UNDP jointly ran a Monitoring and Evaluation workshop in March 2022, providing training to national government agencies, BARMM ministries, and grantees. The workshop aimed to develop the capacities of participants in advancing the results framework of the NAP PCVE.

Al Qalam Institute, through its Madaris Volunteer Mentorship programme, conducted mentor-mentee sessions to promote peacebuilding through quality education and friendship:



More than the provision of material goods and services, these initiatives opened an avenue for relationship-building between the Madrasah community and other sectors of society. This is an opportunity to sunder the common prejudices between a seemingly invisible community which may feel neglected and abandoned by the larger society and the prejudices of the larger society against the Madaris community.



Story of Change

PEACE HERO KIDS' SOCIAL ACTION is a fundraising initiative started by the Peace Hero kids of Teach Peace Build Peace Movement (TPBPM) from Maharlika Elementary School and Silangan Elementary School in Metro Manila. Both schools are located in the Muslim areas in the country's capital where a number of displaced families from the Marawi siege relocated. Like other IDPs from Marawi, the relocated families here have no homes of their own, simply relying on the support of relatives, with children still unable to attend school because of the pandemic.

Clan feuds, or rido, are also happening in these areas, with some reports of children being involved in violent incidents. After one of the Peace Time sessions, the children had a peace reflective session and identified the challenges children like themselves experienced in their community. They mentioned their mental health struggle because of not being able to go to school and meet their friends. They also shared the challenges of their classmates who do not have the means to buy equipment for online learning. Thus, they conceptualized the Peace Hero Cares Project which aims to help their fellow students during this time of the pandemic. Their goal is to provide tablets and school supplies to selected students from their schools.

To raise funds for this initiative, the kids started collecting scraps and sold them to junk shops. TPBPM helped the kids in this initiative by creating a fundraising poster and because of this, they have collected five tablets and cash totalling PHP 4,300.00 to add to their funds. This surpassed their goal of just providing two tablets. Last month, a fire broke out in the houses at the back of Maharlika Integrated School resulting in the school being converted into an evacuation centre. The children immediately acted and pooled their allowances to purchase snacks that they could give to the children staying in Maharlika IS. They also gathered used clothes to be handed out to their fellow children.

This activity empowers them and provides a platform for children to share and take action on the issues and challenges being faced by their counterparts and their community. By asking them what they can do, their passion and drive are encouraged to help create peaceful homes, schools and communities.



As part of its Peace Education Leadership training course, TPBPM's programme in Shakba focuses on developing second-line leaders grounded on the foundations of peace, good governance, and sustainable development:

"The first day of the training was the most unforgettable time in the session because it felt like it was the beginning of my dream. I was more excited to participate in the training and become more responsible. I believe that teaching peace to children is important for them to understand peace at a young age. It will help them transform conflicts and develop peace values as they grow up."
